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CATCO Presents Gross Indecency: The Three Trials of Oscar Wilde Nov. 2-20, 2016

Regional premiere by Moises Kaufman explores downfall of one of world's greatest writers

In the late 1800s, Oscar Wilde was heralded as a creative genius and the wit of Victorian England with highly acclaimed plays, books and essays, such as *The Importance of Being Earnest* and *The Picture of Dorian Gray*. In a few short months, Wilde's status crumbled, plummeting from the darling of British society and the world into humiliation and ruin.

Wilde's spiraling downfall is dramatically told by Moises Kaufman, one of the great storytellers of contemporary times, who incorporates actual trial transcripts, personal letters and other sources in his work, *Gross Indecency: The three Trials of Oscar Wilde*, a griping two-act play. What started as a criminal libel lawsuit by Wilde became an attack on his work and ultimate arrest and conviction for gross indecency.

"One of our many goals at CATCO is to present new work, as well as regional and world premieres, so it is with great excitement that we are able to present the regional premiere of *Gross Indecency*, a poignant, gripping work, which explores topics as contemporary today as they were more than 100 years ago. This is a work that forces us to think and question written by one of the contemporary theatre's world's most compelling voices," said Steven C. Anderson, director of *Gross Indecency* and CATCO's producing director.

CATCO presents the regional premiere of *Gross Indecency* Nov. 2-20, 2016, at The Verne Riffe Center Studio Two Theatre, 77 S. High St. After its 1997 debut, the play received rave reviews from critics:

Kaufman, born and raised in Venezuela, has received international recognition for his provocative explorations and interpretations of contemporary social issues. Most recently he was honored with a National Medal of Arts award from the National Endowment for the Arts. He received a Guggenheim Fellowship in 2002.

In addition to *Gross Indecency*, Kaufman's other works include *33 Variations* and *The Laramie Project*, which CATCO produced during 2002-03 season.

CATCO welcomes a cast of nine actors, some new to the CATCO stage, as well as two of CATCO's 2016-17 acting apprentices, to perform in *Gross Indecency*. CATCO newcomer and Ohio native Josh Katawick will perform the role of Oscar Wilde. Katawick is a resident ensemble member of the Cincinnati Shakespeare Company, where he recently performed in *The Diary of Anne Frank*. Favorite credits include *Death of a Salesman*, *Hamlet*, *Lion in Winter*, *Glengarry Glen Ross*, and *One Man*, *Two Guvnors*.

He is joined by Christopher Moore Griffin, James Sargent, Ralph E. Scott, Matthew Sierra, Ben Tracy, Danny Turek, David Vargo and Douglas Whaley. Griffin was last seen in *Sticks & Stones* at Evolution Theatre, and appeared in CATCO's 2015 season opener of *The Elephant Man*. Other credits include *Sunset Boulevard* and *Sunday in the Park with George* at Short North Stage. Sargent's CATCO credits include *The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee, Evil Dead the Musical* and *What the Butler Saw*. He also served as choreographer for CATCO is Kids' recent production of *James and the Giant Peach JR*. Scott, a graduate of *The Second City in Chicago*, has performed at CATCO in *The Final Table, My Name Is Asher Lev*, and *Bengal Tiger At The Baghdad Zoo*. Ralph can be seen in the soon-to-be-released horror-comedy *Demon Hole* and *Looking for The Jackalope* with Stephen Root. Sierra, a CATCO 2016-17 acting apprentice, has appeared on stage recently at multiple central Ohio theatre organizations. His acting credits include *Skylight* with Columbus Civic Theatre, *The Kabuki Sleeping Beauty* with CATCO is Kids, and *POZ* with Evolution Theatre company.

Tracy, also a CATCO 2016-17 acting apprentice, recently graduated from Wright State University where he appeared in *The Great Gatsby* (Nick Carraway) and *The Music Man* (Charlie Cowell), among other shows. A native of Minneapolis, he has worked with CLIMB Theatre and Old Log Theatre. Turek, who appeared in CATCO's *Peter and the Starcatcher* last holiday season, has been involved in main-stage shows at The Ohio State University, such as *As You Like It* (school tour) and *Standing on Ceremony: The Gay Marriage Plays*, and student lab shows (*Will'S Burrows* and *The Aliens*). Vargo was last seen at CATCO in *Mothers and Sons*. Other credits include *The Temperamentals* (Jebby Award) at Evolution Theatre, and Little Theatre Off Broadway's *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum* (Gracie Award). Whaley, OSU Professor of Law Emeritus, is making his CATCO debut. Following his retirement, he returned to theatre and has acted in or directed many plays in the Columbus area. Notable roles include King Claudius in *Hamlet*, King Lear in *King Lear*, and Sheridan Whiteside in *The Man Who Came To Dinner*.

Anderson's directing credits include An Act of God, Ring of Fire: The Music of Johnny Cash, Mothers and Sons, Peter and the Starcatcher, The Elephant Man, Buyer & Cellar, The Final Table, Dirty Rotten Scoundrels, Always...Patsy Cline, The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee, Five Guys Named Moe, Avenue Q, The 39 Steps, The Rubenstein Kiss, Souvenir and the highly acclaimed production of Doug Wright's I Am My Own Wife. He has also directed Candide and Hair at The Ohio State University Theatre Department; Love! Velour! Compassion! and The Taste of Sunrise at CATCO; Big River and Pippin at Actors Theatre; A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum at New Harmony Theatre; and Greater Tuna, Little Shop of Horrors, and Assassins at the former Players Theatre Columbus where he served as Associate Producing Director.
