- Noun: A word that is a person, place, thing, or idea.
- Adjective: A word that describes a noun.
- Soggy: Wet and soft.
- Gregarious: Friendly and outgoing.
- Bill: A draft of a new law.
- Law: A rule that citizens of a country must follow. Once a bill is voted on by Congress and signed by the President, it becomes a law.




- Capitol Hill: The name of where Congress is in Washington D.C.
- **Congress:** Where bills are written and voted on in the United States. There are two parts of Congress: The Senate and The House of Representatives. Both parts must approve a bill before it can become a law.
- The Constitution: The set of basic laws for The United States of America.
- The Preamble: The first part of the Constitution that explains why our government is a republic.
- Circulation: How blood flows through the human body.
- **Oxygen:** A chemical element gas that is necessary for life. We breathe oxygen into our lungs, and it travels through our blood.
- **Conjunction:** A word that joins two other sentences, phrases, or clauses together. 'And,' 'but,' and 'or' are classic examples.
- **Satchel:** A small bag with a shoulder strap.
- Liberty: Freedom.
- Immigrant: Someone who was born in one country but decides to move and live a different one.
- Galaxy: A collection of solar systems that are closest to each other.
- Star: A burning ball of gas in space.
- Planet: A natural body that orbits a star. Earth is a planet.



• Interjections: A word that shows emotion or excitement usually set apart from a sentence with an exclamation point. Awesome!








CURTAIN CALL CROSSWORD


